Dear MMUUSD Families and Community,

Supporting Children and Teens with the Ongoing Impact of COVID-19

Information from Joelle van Lent, Psy.D.

Joelle is a psychologist that works in many schools across northern and central Vermont. She has supported our District's response to the Covid-19 pandemic and advises on how we can foster the resilience of our students and promote healthy development. Below are some ideas and considerations from Joelle for parents and caregivers. For a full list, click HERE.

What have we noticed so far this year?

- In general, our students continue to be very happy to be in school, joyful in the activities and eager to participate in all aspects of our school routine and community.
- The start to the school year was more challenging than anticipated due to:
 - Stress induced regression People show a less mature version of themselves when stressed.
 - Children are starting to settle in and this aspect of the situation is improving.
 - Lagging skills- The impact of reduced healthy face-to-face social interaction for a prolonged time has resulted in ou students being immature in social-emotional skills and in need of the kinds of supports and structures typically offered to younger students.
 - Schools have adapted and are offering supports and structure that meets the students where they are developmentally. The schools are prioritizing the types of experiences and activites that teach the skills that are lagging.
 - Collective Grief- Adults and students wanted to move from the pandemic this fall and return to normalcy. The Delta variant has resulted in our continuing to be in a phase of coping with COVID rather than recovering from it.

What can we do for the children and teens?

- 1. Build skills through play! Find games as a family that build the skills you see your child needs to improve.
- 2. When your child returns home stressed, resist the temptation to dive in with them! Validate, distract, and move into the routine of home.
- 3. Stress explains but does not excuse misbehavior. Watch this video!
- 4. Children and teens feel unsettled, startled, and scared when their adult appears to be in conflict. When you are worried, stressed, or confused, please reach out to your school. When you reach out, pay attention to the language, tone, and emotion that you access. Our children feel calm, secure, and curious when they see their adults collaborating on their behalf even and especially when we don't agree or don't immediately know the solution.

Health Update

<u>Test to Stay (TTS) Program - How is it going?</u>

We have fully implemented Test to Stay (TTS) for our K - 8 students.

TTS allows students who are in quarantine because of a school exposure to take an antigen test at school at least through day 7 of their exposure. With a negative test result, students are allowed to attend school for the day. Please see this link for additional information - MMUUSD TTS

- TTS is for students grades K 8 who are not fully vaccinated.
- TTS is for close contacts from school.
- TTS is for students who do not have any symptoms.
- TTS requires that students quarantine when not at school. That means students involved in TTS should not be leaving home or having guests to the home.

Continued Vigilance

We are asking families to remain vigilant. Please keep sick students home regardless of vaccination status. Anyone with symptoms should get a PCR test. Please work with your school nurse about a return to school plan after illness. Athletics

MMUUSD and the Champlain Valley Superintendents Association strongly recommend that all eligible student-athletes get vaccinated. Unvaccinated student athletes and any athlete participating in activities where masks cannot be consistently worn (i.e., wrestling, dance) should participate in weekly testing. We anticipate testing these athletes at MMU starting next week.

Curriculum and Innovation

Anti-Bias/Anti-Racism (ABAR) Updates

We are continuing with our district-wide work towards creating more diverse, equitable, and inclusive learning environments for all of our students. School-based ABAR committees are focused on remedying context specific issues within their buildings, while the district-level ABAR council is focused on discussing broader issues and topics. Thus far, the district ABAR council has met once (in October), with our next meeting occurring on December 15th. This year we have partnered with Dr. Luvelle Brown to facilitate these meetings, in addition to leading professional learning sessions with our teachers, administrators, and school board. Looking to the future, we hope to develop a process to audit our curriculum, in particular our social studies curriculum, to ensure that what we teach is inclusive and culturally responsive.

Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) Updates

Our efforts at building a robust multi-tiered system of supports (MTSS), aligned with Act 173 (2018), is going well despite the many distractions and constraints of the ongoing COVID pandemic. As a reminder, MTSS (also known as Response to Intervention or RTI) is a system to ensure that all students receive timely and targeted support for academic, behavioral, and/or social-emotional needs. This system is predicated on leveraging data (from formative assessments & universal screeners) to make sure students do not "fall through the cracks" and are provided "just in time" assistance.

Pam Arnold, our district MTSS consultant, is working closely with our school principals to build a solid foundation towards current and future implementation efforts around MTSS. Specifically, she is supporting principals with building school-based leadership teams and with crafting a shared understanding of what MTSS looks like. This year, we are trying to focus on firming up our educational systems and structures at each of our schools. One project that we are nearing completion of is developing a consistent Educational Support Team (EST) process, with common documentation across our schools. Additionally, we are aligning the EST process with other elements of our multi-tiered system of supports (MTSS) for greater coherence between all aspects of our teaching and learning systems. Implementation of MTSS is a multi-year endeavor. We will continue to provide periodic updates as we move forward.

Other Important Notes

Transportation:

Mount Mansfield Unified Union School District was one of two school districts and communities selected to participate in a feasibility study of the **Future of Rural Transit Project.** The Future of Rural Transit is a coalition of VTrans and other partners seeking to expand transportation options by combining school and public bus service (adding options beyond the existing, exclusive pupil transportation). This survey <u>HERE</u> will help the project team gather valuable feedback on potential routes. Responses will be anonymous.
